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# How it all began

**Pincher Creek** was named in 1874 by a patrol of the Northwest Mounted Police who were surprised to find a pair of pincers – a common farrier's tool – in the creek bottom. The rusting implement had been lost on the rocky creek bank six years earlier by American prospectors who camped here while on the way to the gold fields in British Columbia. Many of these individuals returned to the Pincher Creek area as early pioneers. In 1878, the Mounties established a breeding ranch at Pincher Creek to supply the cavalry-inspired force with sturdy remounts. Horse raising and equestrian training has continued here ever since, with the professional rodeo drawing enthusiasts from cattle ranches, Hutterite colonies and the neighbouring Piikani Reserve every August.

**Twin Butte** was named in the early 1900s through the efforts of area pioneer Tillie Mitchell. Two small hills similar in size and shape overlook Yarrow Creek, serving as visible icons to hamlet residents and travellers coming through the area. More than forty-three extended ranching families settled in the area, between 1885 and the First World War. The Twin Butte School No. 988 operated for over half a century from 1904 to 1958. Located on a well used trail and the subsequent highway between Pincher Creek and Waterton Lakes, Twin Butte became, and continues to be, a stopping point for travellers. The Twin Butte Community Hall was constructed in 1936 and is still the site of many community events today.

**Cowley** has a long ranching heritage which originated long before the establishment of the village itself. The South Fork Ranch was operated from 1883 to 1917 and covered close to 20,000 acres. In the 1880s and 1890s, this district was home to many French ranchers and homesteaders, becoming informally known as French Flats. After the Crowsnest Branch of the C.P.R. was constructed in 1897-1898, Cowley became its eighth siding and quickly flourished as a marketing centre for the local livestock and farming industries. Two massive grain elevators dominated the skyline and four livery stables, two hotels, and a general store came with the boom. The settlement was incorporated as a village in 1906, and a Cowley Board of Trade was organized in the autumn of 1910.

**Beaver Mines** was home to ranchers and homesteaders as early as the 1890s. The area's coal mining potential was recognized by geologists back in the 1880s and mining started as early as 1907. A lack of access to markets was corrected with the 1912 completion of the Kootenay and Alberta Railway, linking Beaver Mines with the C.P.R. one mile west of Pincher Creek and featured two wooden railway trestles at Lang's Coulee and Mountain Mill. Following the decline of the coal mining industry, the community returned to its ranching and farming roots.

**Lundbreck's** economic history has connections with both the ranching and coal mining industries. The area's first ranch, dating from 1879, was the 40,000 acre Garnett Bros. spread between the Middle and South Forks of the Oldman River that extended as far west as the Crowsnest Pass. Four years later, half of it was purchased by F. W. Godsall. During the 1910s, the Doukhobor community established a series of farms in the Lundbreck area. Two coal mines dated back to the 1880s, one being established just north of the Middle Fork by local pioneer Mart Holloway. The second, the Galbraith Coal Mine, also operated during the 1880s and re-opened in 1904, following the establishment of Lundbreck's C.P.R. siding. Yet, the best remembered coal mine was one established in the early 1900s by Mess. Breckenridge and Lund, credited with the naming of Lundbreck.

The Pincher Creek Swimming Pool includes an indoor waterslide, climbing wall, 6 lane, 25 metre pool, wading pool, 20 person hot tub, 1 meter diving board, tarzan rope, basketball hoops and a slide for children. Monthly features include themes and fun activities for young swimmers. Outside the pool in the summer, families can enjoy the spray park! Food trucks are often found in the parking lot making this a great place for picnics and to cool off!

All A-Board! Paddle board that is..... or maybe a kayak or canoe.

If you love to get out onto the water then you must check out these great locations, only a short distance from Pincher Creek!

**Beauvais Lake** (1) is located in it's namesake Provincial Park and is only 11.5 km west of Pincher Creek on Hwy. 507, then 8.5 km south on Hwy. 775. This is a nice sized lake with lots of bird watching and fishing opportunities as you cruise along. Come for the day, or book a campsite and stay longer. There is a nice boat launch near the campground to get you into the water.

Continue on down Hwy 507 west to Beaver Mines Lake and Lee Lake.

**Beaver Mines Lake** (2) is located in the beautiful Castle Provincial Park, 20 km west of Pincher Creek on Hwy. 507, turn left at the crossroads into Beaver Mines - then continue 10 kms on Hwy. 774 and finally 5 km south on a gravel road (follow the Campground sign turnoff). This large lake is nestled at the base of Table Mountain and enjoys incredible views. In addition to the boat launch, there are many areas along the shore to set off on your adventure. Wildlife abounds in this area so there are many opportunities for great photos and up close encounters. There are also camp sites available, as well as Glamping if you want to stay for a few days to fully enjoy this area.

If you turn right (north) at the crossroads by Beaver Mines and continue North on Hwy 507, you will come across **Lee Lake** (3). This little lake is perfect for beginners, or those who just want a nice relaxing paddle. It is a Day Use only location and is often calm. You can circle the lake in an hour if you want. It is a great fishing spot, and I have often seen Bald Eagles and Osprey diving from the trees for their own catch. There are also Loons and other birds that call Lee Lake home. As well as magnificent Dragon Flies! Huge with incredible colours. Another lovely location to get on the water and enjoy nature.

Wanting something bigger and more adventurous? Well then, take Hwy 3 west of Pincher Creek and turn right (north) at Cowley onto Hwy. 510. Follow this road until the crossroads (you will go over a bridge with a fabulous view of the Crowsnest River/Oldman River). Turn right (east) at the stop sign and in less than a km is the sign for the **North Fork Campground** (4). This is part of the Oldman Dam Provincial Recreation Area. This spot has a great boat launch and sets you out into a nice sheltered bay. From here you can cruise north up the Oldman River (depending on water levels), or circle around the bay. Pelicans are often seen in this area, along with Canada Geese and several species of ducks. Deer are common along the shore, eating the fresh grass.

At the south end of the bay, you can access the **Crowsnest/Oldman River** (5) that you viewed while crossing the bridge.

This area can be windy and there is a decent current, but the views are incredible and you can paddle for hours in either direction to your heart's content! There are several smaller coulees you can explore if the water is high. Head east past the RV park to the mouth of the **Castle River** (6) that flows in from the south. Here there are several small islands you can paddle around or stop for a lunch break.

Along this larger section of the Oldman Dam Provincial Recreation Area, there are lots of places to go ashore and explore within the Recreation Boundary. The Boundary is marked by a wire fence and yellow signs. Remember that it is Private property on the other side of the fence, so stay within the Boundary while you explore or stop for a swim or lunch. If the water is low, the sandy ground will be soft and spongy! Take care when landing.

Feeling especially Adventurous? If you are advanced and looking for a challenge, then head to **Windy Point** (7) 12.5 km on Hwy 785 just north of Pincher Creek. This location is at the Oldman Dam Reservoir and is also part of the Oldman Dam Provincial Recreation Area.

Driving from Pincher Creek you can either take Hwy 785 from Hwy 6 on the east end of town (turn left at the car dealership), or you can take Hwy 3 east and turn left (north) onto Hwy 785. After passing the wind farms, you will cross over the Oldman Dam Spillway (there is a very cool lookout spot you can stop and take some photos).

This part of the Recreation Area is usually quite windy (hence the name) and you can often see Kite Surfers playing in the waves at Windy Point. White caps are not unusual on a windy day!

The surface of the Reservoir changes with the water levels. In early Spring and Summer, it is just one large open area, though there are several smaller coulees to the north that you can explore. As the water levels fall throughout the summer and fall, you will find "islands" and sand bars appearing. These are fun to land on and explore, or just take a break from paddling.

You may also see pelicans, gulls, hawks and deer as you cruise around the Reservoir.


There are camp sites available here also, but remember.... Windy Point. LOL.

Regardless of where you choose to paddle, ALWAYS be Bear Aware! This is their habitat and are often seen in these areas. Watch for signage if an area is closed, or if bears have been spotted, and do not enter. If you decide to get off the water and go for a hike, carry bear spray and make noise as you are hiking. Do not let dogs run loose, they should always be on a leash.

## Kootenai Brown Historical Park

In 1865, John George “Kootenai” Brown crossed the Rocky Mountains and declared, “This is the country for me.” Today, Kootenai Brown Historical Park invites you to explore the rich culture and history of southwest Alberta.

Just off Main Street in Pincher Creek, this six-acre heritage site brings the past to life. Step into a recreated pioneer village, where dozens of historic buildings from 1878 to 1939 have been restored and reimagined. Inside, thousands of artifacts tell the stories of those who shaped the region.

Wander through the schoolhouse, Mountie outpost, and General Store. Ride the caboose, trade furs, or admire our vintage car collection. Take a break at the Garden Cafe & Bunny Bar, enjoy the community gardens, and experience history hands-on.

Begin your visit at Pioneer Place, where the Pincher Creek Visitor Information Centre can help you discover local attractions. Explore our First Nations gallery and special exhibits, or shop the Country Store for artisan goods, unique gifts, and books by local authors. Want to learn more? ## Heritage Acres Farm Museum

Nestled in the foothills near the Oldman River Dam, Heritage Acres Farm Museum spans 180 acres of history and rural charm. Established in 1988, it is Alberta’s largest independent agricultural museum, home to a vast collection of pioneer and farm artifacts.

# Self-Guided Walking Tour

## 1. Pincher Creek Multi-Purpose Facility Murals and Flower Beds:

Start your self-guided tour by viewing the “Finding the Pinchers” mural located on the east side of the building, near the library doors. This mural depicts the moment that Pincher Creek got its name. From here, make your way west along the building to enjoy the peaceful flower bed display complete with a bridge! Finally, head inside the pool lobby or walk past the large glass windows at the front of the building to view a familiar landscape painted in 2002 by artist Gerry Houghton.

## 2. St. John’s Anglican Church:

As you head west along Main Street, take note of the wonderful stained glass windows in St. John’s Anglican Church across the street, the oldest Anglican church in continuous use in Alberta.

## 3. Provincial Building:

Next door, you will see the provincial building with gardens maintained by the province.

## 4. Kootenai Brown Historical Park:

A historical gem in the heart of Pincher Creek, the village contains 31 historical buildings and over 30,000 artifacts throughout, and is the Town’s official Visitor Information Centre.

## 5. Pincher Park Beds and “Cattle Drive” Mural:

Cross the road at the four-way stop to take in the metal pincers sculpture surrounded by a well-maintained flower bed. While there, take a look at the “Cattle Drive” mural completed by Penny Corradine.

## 6. Cenotaph Park:

Established to commemorate local soldiers who lost their lives in the World Wars, Cenotaph Park is now home to the Pincher Creek Chamber of Commerce’s weekly Farmers Markets. Featuring a water fountain and many gardens lovingly cared for by Pincher Planters.

## 7. Centennial Park:

Developed to commemorate Alberta’s 100th birthday, this park displays a clock, plantings, and benches. Also take in the murals on the side of the Pincher Creek Legion building - some a tribute to men and women that served in the war, and others Western themed.

## 8. “Downtown in the 40s and 50s” Mural:

Penny Corradine returned once again to paint a life-like depiction of a bustling downtown scene from the past.

## 9. Lebel Mansion Rose Garden:

The beautiful rose garden located next to Lebel Mansion has over 25 variety of roses that will bloom all summer long. Tended by the Oldman Rose Society. Note: the road to the garden is steep!

## 10. Post Office Flower Bed:

On your way back east, stop at the post office to take in the beautifully designed flowers beds created and maintained by Pincher Planters.

## 11. “Mountain Mill” Mural:


Located on the west side of the Vision Credit Union building, the “Mountain Mill” mural showcases Pincher Creek’s rich logging history. Completed by Bruce Brady.

## 12. Pincher Creek United Church:

In 1917, the Presbyterian and Methodist churches combined to become Canada’s first United Church. Sit for a moment on one of the two benches donated by Donna Elliot and enjoy the garden beds maintained by church members.

## 13. Pincher Creek Town Hall:

Round out your tour at the Town’s main government office. Originally a school, the current Town Hall opened in 2000. See the many perennial beds and admire the “Cottonwood Tree” sculpture designed for the Town by artist Rafael Moreno.



# Pincher Creek: A Blooming Community

## A BLOSSOMING HISTORY

By 1998, the Planters had beautified Cenotaph Park, Pioneer Cemetery, and the Museum grounds.

The Town won a Provincial Communities in Bloom title in 2001 and a National title in 2009.

When you visit Pincher Creek, it feels like stepping into a scene from Yellowstone or Heartland. Nestled in the prairies and surrounded by rolling ranchlands, the town looks out toward towering mountains that humble us in size. While these television shows dramatize their characters, drama isn't what defines life here. What Pincher Creek does share is something quieter and more meaningful: every great story begins and ends with the people we love.

Rocking on a porch swing as the sun dips behind the mountains, it's easy to drift into dreams of the next adventure. But it's about more than adventure alone. Just a short distance away, Castle Provincial Parks and Waterton Lakes National Park, both part of the Canadian Rockies, sit in Pincher Creek's sunset view. These mountains are full of stories, both past and still waiting to be written. When I think back on my time in the mountains, what stays with me most isn't the places themselves, but the people beside me. The laughter, the conversations, the mishaps, and the shared moments along the way are what pop into my mind.

As I write this, I'm sitting in a place that immediately brings my dad to mind. I lost him to cancer not long ago, and thinking of him still fills me with warmth. He loved the outdoors deeply. For a time, he balanced a corporate job while farming on the side, before eventually taking early retirement to farm full-time—right up until his body told him it was time to stop. He had a deep connection to the land and cherished time spent in nature with his family. More than anything, he valued disconnecting from the noise of society and reconnecting with the people around him, building relationships that ran deep and true.

Looking at these mountains, I remember stories of my dad. He always loved a good blueberry pie. He liked to joke that he married my mom because of hers. Growing up, blueberry patches were just a short walk from our house, and berry-picking was woven into my childhood. So when I told my dad there were huckleberries in these mountains, he didn't hesitate. It became one of our very first adventures in the Castle.

The thing about huckleberries on the Alberta side of the Continental Divide is that you have to earn them. That usually means hiking, biking, quadding, or bribing to reach them. They don't grow at lower elevations, and if you ever stumble upon a good, easily accessible patch, you definitely don't tell anyone. The best huckleberries are far from civilization, but the reward is the journey itself, with scenery that makes every step worthwhile.

My dad, a true farmer to his core, didn't complain once when he decided to wear his rubber boots on our first huckleberry trip. We hiked 12 kilometres round-trip with 600 metres of elevation gain. Not a single uncomfortable moan from this rubber-boot farmer turned hiker. We picked buckets full of berries, didn't see another soul on the trail, and thankfully didn't run into any bears either. Back home, my mom and I (mostly my mom) turned berries into two of the best pies in the world. Every bite tasted like the day we had shared. We didn't share any pie with anyone else. At the end, my dad held up his squeaky-clean plate, stuck out his purple tongue, and proudly declared, "I'm done." I never thought my dad would love a pie more than blueberry, but huckleberries won him over completely. From that day on, I knew I could lure him away from the hayfields most summers if I promised huckleberry-picking. And I did. He never made it to the Huckleberry Festival at Castle Mountain Resort, but I know he would have loved the chairlift ride—accessing huckleberries without a 12-kilometre hike would have felt like a small miracle.

Berry-picking wasn't the only thing my dad loved. He loved fishing, and any kind of fishing. Ice fishing, fly fishing, lake fishing—if there were fish involved, he was in. And southern Alberta is a perfect place for it. The creeks offer beautiful fly-fishing, and winters bring unforgettable days on the ice at Beaver Mines Lake or Beauvais Lake, to name just a couple.

The nature surrounding Pincher Creek is truly something special. It gives us more than adventure—it gives us space to heal. The summer my dad passed was an especially busy one for me, juggling a business and collecting data in Waterton for my MSc. Much of the time I had to process my grief was

spent with coworkers, but always in nature. I often sat at Knight Lake, feeling my dad's presence with me as I watched the water ripple and the breeze move through the leaves. To this day, I still pause at the park gates and say hi to him.

After my dad passed, I turned to the outdoors to help me heal. In the weeks before the snow fell, I summited several new-to-me peaks to help me process and to remember. Standing on top of a mountain humbles me as I am surrounded by a sea of peaks, you can't help but feel small in the best possible way. Most importantly, those moments outdoors continue to remind me of the people I love and the memories we've built together.

If there's one lesson I hope you take from my dad, it's this: disconnect from the noise of society and invest in deeply rooted connections with the people who matter most. You can follow in his footsteps (rubber boots optional) and take adventures with people who are important to you. If you do, you'll always have an adventure waiting, and a place where your memories can live on.





Pincher Creek is in the center of many of Southern Alberta's finest parks! Alberta's parks are valued as natural landscapes that preserve the environmental diversity of the province and inspire people to enjoy and rediscover our connection with the natural world. **1. Beauvais Lake Provincial Park:** A quiet lake set in the montane forest with over 30 kilometers of trails for hiking in the summer and for snow shoeing and cross-country skiing in the winter. Environmental education, bird watching, historic homesteads and camping complete the year round experience.

**2. Castle Provincial Park and Wildland Provincial Park** protect valuable watersheds and habitat for more than 200 rare species. The parks offer a wide variety of front and back country experiences including hiking, camping, fishing, wildlife viewing, scrambling, climbing, and mountain biking. Hear the call of the loon, watch the fish jump and admire spectacular sunsets from your campsite along the lake and beneath the majesty of Table Mountain or relax in the shade along the river in some of Castle Provincial Park's upgraded campgrounds at Beaver Mines Lake, Castle Falls and Castle River. Syncline Trails is a wonderful place to enjoy the outdoors for a day trip with groomed trails, some trackset for cross-country skiing in the winter. Visit [albertaparks.ca/castle](http://albertaparks.ca/castle) for more information.

**3. Lundbreck Falls PRA:** Get your close-up photograph of the falls at a spectacular angle from the safety of the viewing platforms. This is a superb place to stop for a lunch or photo break while making your way to your dream campsite along the river.

**4. Maycroft PRA:** This small campground is located off Highway 22 along the Oldman River. Enjoy this pleasant spot with great access to nearby hiking, hunting or angling opportunities.

**5. Oldman Dam PRA:** Camp along the Oldman River in the Cottonwood Campground which has both power and basic sites and is next door to the Three Rivers Group Camp. For sewer hook ups, choose Castlevue Campground which is located a few minutes west on the north side of the river. Windy Point is just down the road and offers great access to the reservoir. Enjoy windsurfing, boating and sailing – all while nestled against the Rocky Mountains and only a few minutes from Pincher Creek.

**6. Waterton Reservoir PRA:** Open all year. A small campground is right near the shore, so you can enjoy ice fishing in the winter and water skiing in the summer. Close proximity to Waterton Lakes National Park and easy access to the reservoir, via a boat ramp and a dock, make this a popular campsite.

# Protect Our Lakes

There are many boating choices to be found, but it is important to remember to clean, drain & dry your boat to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species.



**7. Castle Mountain Resort:** By traveling just 40 minutes from Town, you can be whisking your way up one of the chair lifts at our local Ski Resort. From surface lifts for beginners to die hard terrain for the advanced skier and rider, there is something for everyone at Castle. Powder Stagecoach Cat Skiing offers a unique powder thrill for adventure seekers.

**8. Frank Slide Interpretive Centre,** which commemorates Canada's deadliest rockslide, is 25 minutes away. The Interpretive Centre highlights the rich heritage of the Crowsnest Pass amid the breathtaking beauty of the Canadian Rockies. The Centre is open all year round and visitors will be greeted by friendly, knowledgeable staff who will share the fascinating stories of the Frank Slide through dynamic interpretive programs and presentations.

**9. The Great Canadian Barn Dance** will have you immersed in Southern Alberta's western culture from the moment you arrive. In 35 minutes, you can be enjoying a country cooked dinner and live stage show and then be kicking up your heels to the sounds of the house band.

**10. Head Smashed In Buffalo Jump:** Discover one of the world's oldest, largest and best preserved buffalo jumps. The Jump bears witness to a method of hunting practiced by Indigenous people of the North American plains for nearly 6,000 years. The UNESCO heritage site designation places it among other world heritage monuments, such as the Egyptian pyramids, Stonehenge and the Galapagos Islands.

**11. Waterton Lakes National Park:** Pincher Creek is the gateway for Waterton Lakes National Park, which is only 40 minutes away along a gorgeously scenic drive. Clear lakes, thundering waterfalls, rainbow-colored streams, and rocky mountain vistas await hikers and sightseers. With an exceptional diversity of wildlife and wildflowers along with a cozy little waterfront town, Waterton packs a big natural punch into a relatively small and accessible area. Seasonal options vary - check hours in advance.

**12. Bellevue Underground Mine Tour** will take you 1,000 feet into the mine, where you will be 150 feet below the surface. Explore the mine's inner-workings while you learn about the rich history of one of Canada's underground coal mines.

**13. Cowley Glider Strip** is located about 10 kilometres north of the village of Cowley. Cowley has a long history of being the wave flying capital of Canada, and soaring activities have been taking place here since the early 1960s.
